### Marker Sentences:

- I **should have studied** harder for my online exam.
- She **could have joined** the virtual course, but she didn't.
- He **would have passed** the test if he had watched the video lessons.

Form	Meaning
Should have + past participle	It was a good idea, but it didn't happen.
Could have + past participle	It was possible, but it didn't happen.
Would have + past participle	Imaginary or likely result in the past.

### Examples:

- I should have joined the class earlier.
- She could have learned more if she had practiced.
- He would have succeeded if he had tried harder.
