- Respond politely
- Say something friendly

Nice to meet you

Present perfect

- 1- Began in the past and continue the present.
- 2- Happened at an indefinite past time and affect the present
- 3- happen more than once in the past.

I did my homework. then I went to the gym.
I traveled to my hometown I spent time on there.
I won a lottery ticket for second times.

Simple past

To complete actions or situations at a specific past time.

Clarify emphasis experience

Already; (?),(+) statement: to check sth that happened in the past.

(not)yet; (?),(-) statement: for emphasis.

(not)ever/never; (?),(-) statement: talk about sth that has or has not happened at any time before now.

(?) Has Roberta **already** left?
(+) We have **already** studied this.

(?) Have you done the writing homework **yet**?
(-) John hasn't sent the text message **yet**.

(?) Have you **ever** met her?
(+) We have **never** lost our house key.
(-) We **haven't ever** been board in class.

Summary: Endangered Languages

- There are about 7,099 languages in the world, but most people speak only a few large languages. Many smaller languages are disappearing. According to UNESCO, around one third of the world's languages have fewer than 1,000 speakers, and many have already died out.
- When a language disappears, culture and knowledge are also lost. Languages show how people live and think, such as the Tuvan language, which reflects a close connection between people and animals. Some countries are trying to protect endangered languages through education and government support. Technology, like online talking dictionaries, can also help save these languages.
