Travel is part of life for many people, but there are many types of travel and diverse reasons for taking a trip.

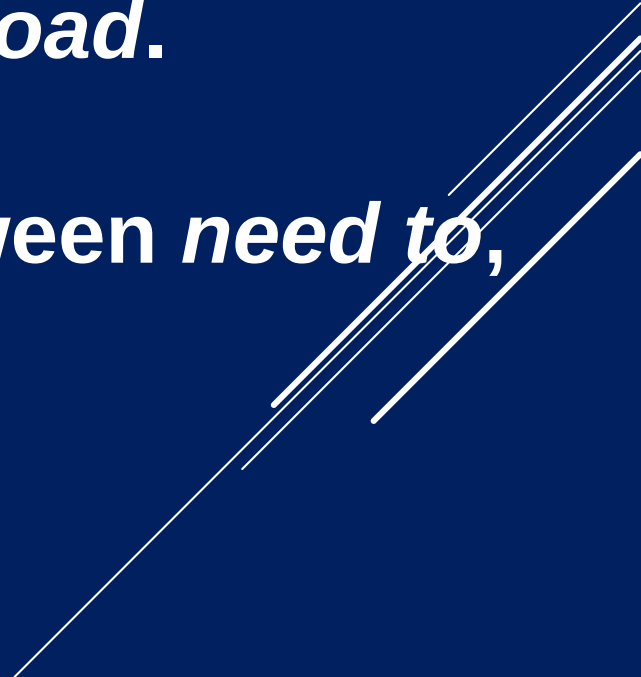

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Grammar

1. *I **need to** book my flight to (city).*
2. *I **have to** make a hotel reservation.*
3. *You **must** have a passport to travel abroad.*

What are the differences in meaning between *need to*, *have to*, and *must* ?

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Grammar

Use **must + verb** to say that something is an obligation or a rule.

Use **have to or need to + verb** to say that something is necessary.

Use **don't have to** or **don't need to + verb** to say that something is not necessary

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How do we express needs, requirements, and rules in English?

What about the opposite (when you are not allowed to do something or when something is prohibited)

*You **must not** copy another student's answers during a test.*

*You **can't** take large bags on the plane with you.*

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Grammar: Expressing Prohibition

Both *must not* and *can't* are used to express the idea that an action is **not allowed**. However, *must not* is stronger and more formal than *can't* and is more often used for **rules and laws**.
